Commonsense fixes needed to protect communities from CO2 pipeline hazards and to correct gaps in the House T&I PIPES Act

Dear Chair Cruz and Ranking Member Cantwell:

On behalf of an alliance of public-interest, landowner, Indigenous, and environmental justice organizations, we write to register our dissatisfaction with the House Transportation & Infrastructure PIPES Act and to urge the Senate Commerce Committee to advance evidence-based safety measures that protect communities from dangerous CO2 pipelines.

As documented in a May 15 letter to House and Senate leadership and a Sept 17 letter to House T&I leadership, the House approach to carbon dioxide safety is wholly inadequate. Since CO2 pipelines are almost entirely funded through hundreds of billions of taxpayer dollars and require the taking of vast numbers of private properties via eminent domain and thus violations of communities' right to self-determination, the least Congress can do is ensure that federal pipeline safety law will protect threatened landowners and communities.

We urge the Committee to include the following safety measures in its bill:

- Require operators and developers to disclose emergency-response information to state and local first responders, route permitting agencies, and the public, including plume dispersion maps, to allow rigorous state, local, and private emergency response planning and route selection.
- Require CO2 pipeline companies to fund local emergency response planning and preparedness including training, drills, equipment, personal protective equipment, and real-time public alert systems.
- Clarify that nothing in the Pipeline Safety Act prevents states and local governments from setting zoning and routing requirements for hazardous liquid or CO2 pipeline facilities that serve safety objectives, consistent with PHMSA's understanding detailed in letters to proposed CO2 operators.
- Clarify that the Pipeline Safety Act does not regulate pipelines after they have been
 permanently removed from service, thereby confirming that state and local
 governments may protect landowner property interests through mitigation of
 abandoned pipeline infrastructure. Landowners should not be forced to bear
 post-abandonment impacts such as soil disturbance, interference with agricultural
 drainage/tile, and constraints on future development.

We urge the Senate Commerce Committee to require PHMSA to:

- Establish a default minimum 2 mile emergency planning zone for CO2 pipelines;
- Set safety standards for CO2 pipeline leak detection;
- Require shorter distances between automatic shutoff valves;
- Establish limits on contaminants that drive corrosion and brittle fractures:
- Strengthen fracture-control requirements;
- Continue research on odorants;
- Require public alert systems via texts and phone calls in the event of a rupture; and
- Disclosure of public communications in multiple languages.

We stand ready to work with the lawmakers to ensure we have CO2 pipeline laws that put the safety and well being of communities above that of project developers who seek to profit by exploiting communities with these dangerous projects.
